## Dailey And Feeney Merit Finalists



Bonnie Dailey and Andrew Feeney. Among the fourteen Detroit seniors who placed in the National Merit Scholarships were Redfordites Bonnie Dailey and Andrew Feeney.

The awards provide \$400 to \$6,000 each, depending on the student's need and total more than \$8 million.

NMSC provides 625 scholarships, while funds for the rest were provided by 310 sponsors. All scholarships cover four years.

The winners were chosen from 1,400 finalists, the highest scorers in qualifying tests given more than a year ago in 17,600 high schools.

The Michigan Business Show held a contest at Cass Technical High School on May 16. The sponsor was the Detroit Junior Board of Commerce.

The high schools, public and parochial, in the Metropolitan area entered a contestant for Shorthand and one for Typing. Each year about 80 high schools participate.

## Art Takes Honors

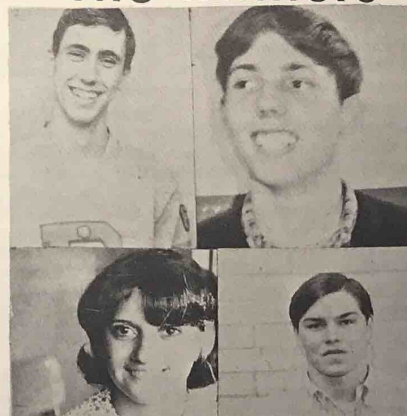

Hundreds of high school juniors will be participating in the Wolverine Boys' State and Girls' State this June.

Five Redfordites attending will be Paul Penzel, Graham Cookson, Tom Bartley, Mike Springer, Larry Perrault and Rochelle Didier.

These students, chosen by members of the American Legion, will spend a week at two Michigan Universities. During this week, they will set up their own state within the college.

Girls State will be held at the University of Michigan from June 14-21. The boys go to Michigan State University from June 16-23.

The requirements for attending vary from state to state. Students from Michigan are selected by the American Legion, must be a leader, have a good scholarship record, and have completed the eleventh grade.

In Ohio, students must be interviewed and write essays.



## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

It has always been the tradition at Redford for the officers of each semester's graduating class to appoint nine chairmen. These chairmen and their committees would decide on the class flower, motto, and colors, planning the Senior Prom, Senior Mixer, Commencement, and Senior Luncheon.

But what has happened to this golden tradition? So far this past semester, we have heard nothing but gripes and complaints because of much unfinished work. It doesn't seem fair that the rest of us Seniors should have to suffer the consequences just because some of the committee's and their chairmen are too LAZY or disinterested to attend or plan meetings or work out some of these formalities.

Where are all these signs that are suppose to inform us of our class colors, motto, flower, the color of our gowns? Is this meant to be a trade secret until graduation?

We recognize the fact that we all have the usual problem of getting started. But when the attitude is taken and still felt near the end of the semester that "I didn't want to be on this committee in the first place," or "Who cares; let the teachers do it"; then why did they sign up for the committees when there were many more wil-

ling, mature, and responsible Seniors who could have easily taken their places?

And Senior officers where are you? Or are you too, just a status symbol that is present at all honor programs?

We Seniors, are frustrated and disgusted with what has been taking place. What is the sense of having a Senior Prom, a luncheon, or even choosing a flower, motto and colors, when we aren't made aware of their decisions?

Perhaps these so called Senior traditions should be eliminated, (in spite of all the fine efforts put forth by Mr. and Mrs. Deason and the other faculty advisors), if they have become such a burden.

A possible solution, might be for the Senior class to elect both the Senior officers and the committee chairmen and their staff. This way all the Seniors would have note as to whom they felt would best qualify for the position and work efficiently and not for a clique status. Perhaps a joint auditorium senior assembly is necessary to give out information to graduates.

Indeed we feel that something definitely needs to be done, that is if the future senior classes are at all interested?

**COMMENT:** At the Outpost's request, eight teachers polled their classes. Of approximately 190 graduating students, only 33 had any information about their senior activities, although it was the week of May 2.

The Outpost reporters found it impossible to do an April or May news story on such activities due to the fact that there was no response to five written requests and as many oral ones for information. Finally it was necessary to obtain the material direct from the sponsors. Five sponsors stated that they were very disappointed with the lack of enthusiasm and attendance by their committees and chairmen.

Out of curiosity, 73 seniors and three 10B classes were questioned as to their sentiments about doing away with the present customary graduation traditions. Not a single person believed that these traditions should be abolished. If anything, the comments revealed that some students are rather sentimental about such supposedly "old fashioned" things. Where does the fault lie?

### Respect for Flag Dying in Us..?

"I am an American--who gets a lump in his throat when he hears the "Star Spangled Banner" and who holds back tears when he hears those chilling high notes of the brassy trumpet when Old Glory reaches the top of the flag pole. ...."

The above quotation appeared in a newsletter of the Dearborn American Legion, the Fort Dearborn Bugle. It was taken from a paper entitled "I am a Tired American", by Alan McIntosh.

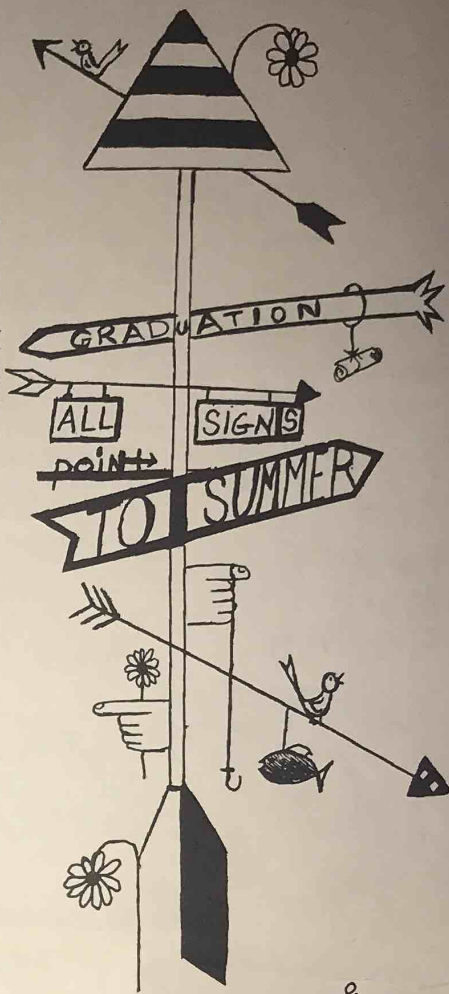
This American is tired of seeing his country's flag--the symbol of a great and free nation--being made the object of riots. He is tired of seeing the American flag disrespected by stonings and burnings in revolting nations.

And yet, this very same flag is disrespected in its own homeland--yes, we Americans show disrespect to our flag not by tearing it or burning it, but by serious neglect. Is the rapidly moving American way of life no longer allowing its citizens the time to teach and to show honor and glory for its own symbol? Has our flag become just another meaningless object, something that is always there, but never noticed? Every day young men die for the flag we neglect. Do they die in vain?

Through a simple procedure we can bring the flag back into our lives. The practice of pledging allegiance to our flag every morning--something we learned years ago, but also something which is not too childish to be forgotten by high school pupils--can be initiated. In addition, instead of having the maintenance employees raise and lower Old Glory, it would be impressive if certain distinguished faculty students execute this honor.

Quite easily we at Dearborn High school can work toward making our flag a dear and cherished possession instead of a mere piece of colored cloth on a stick.

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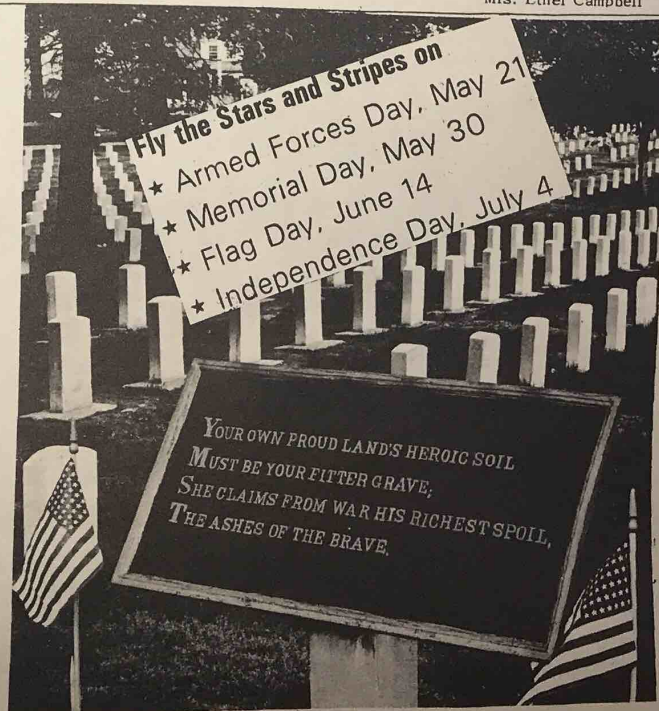

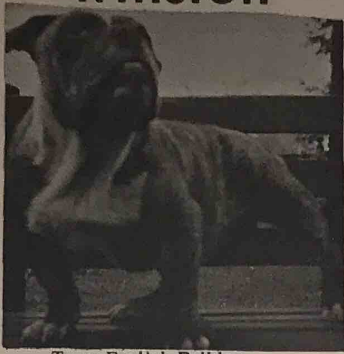

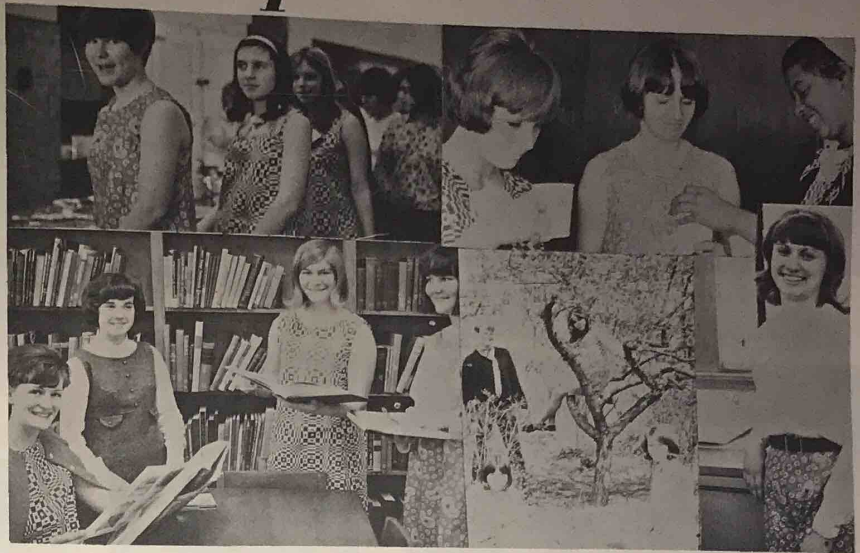


To an English Bulldog

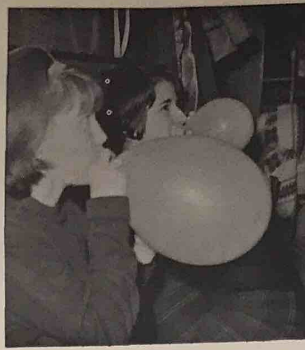
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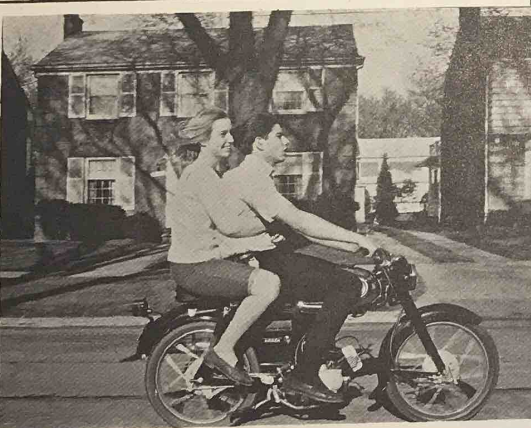
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# Weeks of Practice End, Judges Pick Cheerleaders

The cindermen, however, have bounced back to sweep aside city rivals Henry Ford, Cody, and Western.

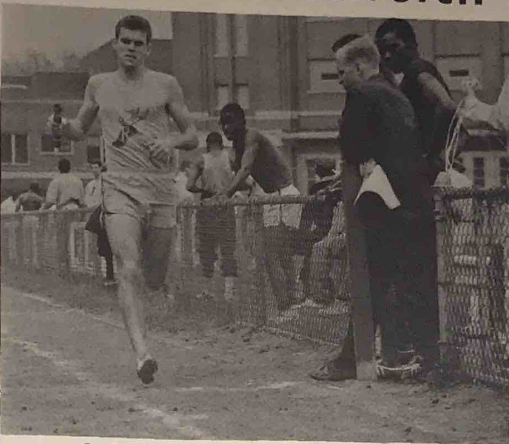
The Huskie tradition of dominance in distance events has continued this season.

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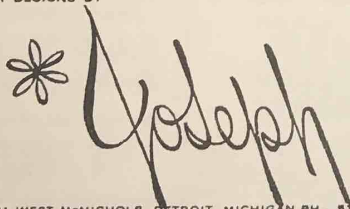
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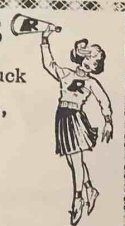
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
